about it if I had granted --

MR. STEWART: Well, you denied it, so we're here and whether -- regardless of where the money's at, we want you to approve it.

THE COURT: Well, does Social Security know that 4800 of that 6700 went to guardian fees? I guess that's --

MS. MARINO: This may be something I have to explain.

THE COURT: Yeah, I think so.

MS. MARINO: It's very complicated and I hope the Court will understand that I'm very glad there's no rules because it makes things easier. One of the challenges in this is asking the attorneys how should I do this, asking the clerks how should I do this, and really getting very inconsistent answers and a lot of I don't know.

The issue with Mr. s that the Social Security benefits that I applied for were paid retroactively and because the estate was going -- I knew it was going to be closing, and the work that was done, they were made the designated representative payee. So those funds were sent to the Moore Center. Once they received those funds they now have to spend it down below \$2500. So they come back and say to me what do we pay. I gave them the outstanding attorney fees for the ward because the Court had denied him court-appointed counsel because he was found not indigent. They paid for some necessities that he needed and a bulk of the outstanding
